As a Geographer, what do I already know?

- In Year 1, we talked about and described our locality and made simple observations during fieldwork.
 In our first term in Year 2, we described some differences between places near the equator and at the poles.

Key Words	
Locality	A particular neighbourhood, place, or region.
Physical features	Natural things that would be here even if there were no people around e.g. seas, mountains and rivers.
Human features	Things that have been built by people e.g. houses, roads and bridges.
Fieldwork	Learning and/or research involving first-hand experience, which takes place outside the classroom.
Climate	Climate is the average measurements of temperature, wind, humidity, snow, and rain in a place over the course of years. Climate is like the weather, but over a long time.
Vegetation	Vegetation is a general term for the plant life of a region; it refers to the ground cover provided by plants.

Knowledge Location
<u>Understanding Place</u>
I can compare places at a local scale (Southampton and Jinja in Uganda) using the following vocabulary: coast, ocean, port, harbour, river, forest, mountain, climate, vegetation, city/town/village.
I recognise and describe simple patterns in the environment (e.g. the variations in traffic during the day, seasonal changes).
Enquiry and Skills
I can investigate my locality through fieldwork and collect data to help me describe and compare places.
I can use atlases, maps (scaled 1:1000 - 1:1250) and globes to identify and describe some features and places.
I can make and use simple maps and plans (paper and digital) to help me investigate and compare places.
I can read, use and make simple symbols on maps and diagrams (to help me find out about places and share information).
I can use aerial images to help me describe what a place is like and locate key features.

Key information—What do I need to know?

- That I can find out more about my locality (Southampton) by conducting fieldwork to see if I can spot any patterns in the environment, such as times of day when traffic is busiest.
- ♦ How I can make simple plans to help me conduct this research and present research on Southampton. I also need to know how to use map symbols to help me share this information.
- The physical and human geography of a local area in Africa similar in size to Southampton—Jinja in Uganda. I then need to be able to compare it with Southampton using key vocabulary such as: coast, ocean, port, harbour, river, forest, mountain, climate, vegetation, city/town/village.
- I will use information discovered during fieldwork, as well as aerial images, to help me describe and compare these places, and locate key features.
